The introduction to professional practice, and those four skills are set on day three in crime and **dispute resolution**, day four property and **wills** day five business uh and so that's 16 assessments effectively over those practice areas and you have to pay again a **fee** and it's 2422 pounds for you to take those assessments so I think the really key thing to come from this is that it costs you to take these assessments so you want to be certain don't you that you're going to pass...
